

Hard Rock Demolitions to Begin

After over six months of debate, the owners of 1031 Canal Street are [moving forward](#) with the demolition of their collapsed project. During this time, the demolition method has shifted from an implosion back to a conventional piece-by-piece deconstruction of the failed structure. We share the entire City's frustrations with this process and are eager to see the full removal of the building and the victims returned to their families.

On **Wednesday, May 6, at 10:00 am, the Central Business District HDLC** will review the proposed demolitions of the three adjacent structures around the collapsed Hard Rock hotel. Two of these, [1019-25 Canal](#) and [1027 Canal](#), both date from the early 1900's and are contributing historic structures to the fabric of the Canal Street corridor.

In December, the City told the public the structures needed to come down to create a buffer zone to protect the rest of the block from a ripple effect the implosion could set off. Furthermore, the implosion was viewed as the safest and most expedient way to bring the structure down to grade. Now, the buildings are reportedly being removed because they will likely be irreparably damaged by falling debris and that the space is needed to accommodate the cranes that would remove the top floors.

VCPORA has consistently questioned the true need for the removal of these structures and asked for alternatives to the wrecking ball. In case you missed it, we published [this piece](#) in the Lens last month and made additional statements [yesterday](#) to local station WDSU. Though both altered decades ago with the addition of facade tiles, the level of original contributing fabric is unknown at this time. Many Canal Street buildings received these "face lifts" between the forties and sixties, but often they were simply applied as screens to the exterior. Many of these applications have been successfully removed, revealing the original architecture underneath. The City has not openly considered options for selective salvage and reuse of contributing elements at these sites and the potential for physical exploratory analysis has yet to be confirmed.

All three structures proposed for demolition are owned by the developers of the collapsed hotel project. Their removal could add a 54% increase in the developable footprint of the site if the owners sought to combine the parcels. Any potential benefits to the owners and developers of this tragedy is inexcusable.




Coronavirus Update

Mayor LaToya Cantrell's issued mandate remains in effect until May 15. Please continue to stay home unless you are going out for critical needs, which include visits to the grocery store, pharmacy, and doctor appointments. Health Department guidelines and directives can be found [here](#).

Drive-through testing for any symptomatic individual over the age of 18 will continue with select sites in Mid-City and New Orleans East next week from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. or until the allotted 250 tests have been taken. Updates around New Orleans

The New Orleans City Council has partnered with the Mayor's Office and the City's Department of Health to launch a centralized website called "[SewDat](#)" for resources and donations for cloth face coverings. Health officials recommend everyone, regardless of symptoms, [wear face masks](#) in public to help slow the spread.

Daily [evening waste collection](#) in the French Quarter and Downtown Development District has been discontinued. [Household Materials Collection Day](#) has also been cancelled.

Short Term Rental (STR) permits that expired between March 20 and June 20 [have been extended three months](#). As a reminder, STRs are illegal in the French Quarter, except along the 200-700 block of Bourbon Street. Report illegal listings to 311 or to str@nola.gov.




Mother's Day

Census participation is private, easy, and very important!

Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion seats in the House of Representatives; to redraw boundaries of congressional and state legislative districts; and to help determine the distribution of more than \$675 billion in federal spending on schools, hospitals, roads, public works, and other vital programs. Participate to make sure the Quarter gets counted!
